Despite his Scottish sounding name, his father was Spanish and his mother of Irish descent. In 1807, the family relocated to New Orleans and his mother died the following year.

The Union's most renowned naval figured, he was the first United States Navy officer to be promoted to the rank of Admiral. Born at Campbell's Station, near Knoxville, Tennessee, after his parents died he was adopted by United States Navy officer David Porter (and thus became step brother to future Union Navy Admiral David Dixon Porter).

David Glasgow Farragut was the Union Admiral who served most of the war as commander of the West Gulf Blockading Squadron. The Southern-born officer led the Union capture of New Orleans in April 1862 and the Batte of Mobile Bay in August 1864, in which he closed the Confederacy's last big port on the Gulf of Mexico.
